

British Civil Rights Movement

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| 1 | Civil rights are human rights that protect people from discrimination. They ensure equality, freedom and justice under the law. |
| 2 | The British Civil Rights Movement was a campaign against racism and discrimination. They aimed to secure equal rights for all. |

Key Activists

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| 3 | Diane Abbott, Claudia Jones and Sam King campaigned for rights, equality, and change in Britain. |
| 4 | Ordinary community members joined protests to challenge unfair treatment. |

Protests and campaigns

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| 9 | Boycotts were used to challenge unfair treatments, such as during the Bristol Bus Boycott. |
| 10 | Activists formed groups like Campaign Against Racial Discrimination to organise marches. |
| 11 | Young people and students helped organise and lead protests. |
| 12 | Newspapers and television helped spread the message of the movement. |



Causes of the British Civil Rights Movement

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| 5 | After World War II, immigration from the Caribbean increased to help rebuild Britain. |
| 6 | People arrived from Africa and Asia to support Britain's economy after the war. |
| 7 | Many minority communities faced segregation, racism and discrimination. |
| 8 | Bias and unfair treatment caused inequality in housing, work, schools and public spaces. |

Changing of laws

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| 13 | The government introduced laws to reduce discrimination and promote equality. |
| 14 | Key laws included the Race Relations Acts (1965, 1968, 1976). |
| 15 | The Commission for Racial Equality was established in 1976 to stop unfair treatment based on race. |
| 16 | Activists, protests and public campaigns influenced laws, which helped ensure justice and a fairer society. |

Impact of British Civil Rights Movement

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| 17 | The British Civil Rights Movement helped communities come together and form organisations to support each other. |
| 18 | Legal changes increased opportunities for minorities. |
| 19 | Public awareness of racism and unfair treatment increased across society. |
| 20 | Some inequalities still exist today. Therefore, campaigns for equality still continue. |
